The Adverse Childhood Experience (ACE) study by Dr. Rob Anda and Dr. Vincent Feliti shows the impact of early childhood violence and trauma. This early exposure negatively influences development, behavior, emotional status, and physical health which, in turn, can lead to increased risk for:

- Depression and Anxiety
- School Absence, Suspension, and Dropouts
- Domestic Violence
- Running Away
- Smoking
- Abusing Drugs and Alcohol
- Incarceration
- Cancer
- Liver Disease
- COPD
- Heart Disease
- Early Death

#### The Child Abuse Council is the Quad Cities' only child abuse prevention agency dedicated to keeping children safe and building strong families.

We focus our efforts on effective, holistic services by approaching child abuse prevention utilizing a public health model through three distinct paradigms:

- 1. **Community Prevention:** Wide-spread education and support for building nurturing families
- 2. Focused Prevention: Targeted engagement and specialized support for families to keep children safe
- 3. **Treatment and Prevention:** Children and families receive therapy and support essential to heal after violence or trauma while teaming with skilled professionals to prevent recurrent abuse and neglect.

#### PROGRAMS

The Child Abuse Council was organized in 1977 through the efforts of citizens and professionals concerned about child abuse and neglect in the Quad Cities. Our philosophy has always been one of community collaboration and responding to community need.

**Basic Training for New Dads:** A program taught by dads for dads. This program started over 15 years ago, is led by volunteer fathers and is the only one of its kind made specifically for fathers as they prepare for the birth of a child.

**Families First:** Designed to support military families in our community to decrease isolation and increase socialization. From activities centered on the father/child relationship to weekly playgroups and regular parenting classes, we partner with the US Army to support our service men and women and their families.

**Talking About Touching:** A program partnering with local preschool programs providing children, teachers, and parents with information they need to stay safe and prevent child sex abuse.

**24/7 Dad:** A 12-week parenting development and support program open to all fathers, taught by nationally certified Quad City dads.

**Healthy Families Home Visitation:** Provides new parents with accredited home visitation services to build parents' skills, reach their goals, and create a safe and nurturing environment for young children.

**Doula:** A Doula is a person who assists a mother before, during, and after childbirth, and supports the family by providing assistance and education. This program ensures that a baby has the very best possible start in life!

**Community Education and Training:** Delivering high quality community education and training to professionals and parents, this program puts the adults in our community right where they should be-at the front of prevention. Keeping children safe should never be the responsibility of a child; adults are responsible for keeping kids safe!

**Safe from the Start**: The program offers play therapy services specifically for children ages 0-5. This comprehensive therapeutic program provides therapy and case management to help children heal from trauma exposure and prevent future trauma from occurring. By supporting a child and their family early, we are able to prevent future problems with things like truancy, juvenile delinquency, physical and mental health challenges.

**Child Protection Center:** The welcoming home environment in our Muscatine facility provides children a place to tell their story after abuse or neglect. Working with law enforcement, DHS, mental health providers, and health care professionals, children receive forensic interviews, medical exams, and coordinated team investigations to ensure children are treated with dignity and respect during the investigative process.

All Our Kids Network: Working to ensure services for children 0-5 are collaborative, comprehensive and reflect our community need. The Network provides structure and support to prioritize partnerships and address barriers to ensure healthy starts for children in our community.
